



A Message from Father Andy and Father Laurent

My dear parishioner,

Happy Palm Sunday! Happy?? Hmm...yes, still very happy! We couldn't have ever planned to have this coming Easter approach us with this crisis, but with basic acknowledgement, we understand why. We always choose life, not death.

This is why we understand these uncomfortable circumstances. On Palm Sunday we are walking with Jesus, to Jesus. It means we start Holy Week for Jesus Himself. This was His last most happy moment in life . People welcomed Him waving palms, and rejoicing, but soon, after a few days, most of the same people shouted, "Crucify Him, crucify Him!"

After Holy Thursday, Jesus is absolutely alone. He knows He has to go through this difficult time, the most difficult time in His public ministry. He has only one goal: that His Father's will is done through His life. He invited each one of us to understand His cross. He did not want us to be crucified with Him, but rather in his darkest hours He prayed for us to be willing to notice at least the shadow of His cross in our lives. The beginning of humankind belongs to God. The end of humankind belongs to Him as well.

Jesus, throughout Holy Week, shows us what it means: to have faith, love and perseverance. This Palm Sunday we ask Jesus to help us to be His great followers. Together, we can overcome our Golgotha, our own Good Friday, and witness with the eyes of our faith His empty tomb on Easter.



Liturgy Notes

Lent is drawing to a close. As we move towards Palm Sunday and the Easter Triduum, the readings speak insistently of death. In contrast, Jesus gives water to drink, opens the eyes of the blind, and breaks the power of death to raise up his friend to new life. In the RCIA process, the third scrutiny of the elect, who are preparing for baptism, takes place on the Fifth Sunday of Lent. The readings of Year A are proclaimed when the scrutinies are celebrated because of baptismal imagery found in John's Gospel stories of the Samaritan woman, the man born blind, and the raising of Lazarus. During the weeks between the three scrutinies, the elect are entrusted with the Creed and the Lord's Prayer, ancient texts that express the heart of the Church's faith and prayer. The Creed recalls the wonderful deeds of God for the salvation of the human race. The Lord's Prayer, from antiquity, has been the prayer for those who in baptism receive the spirit of adoption and call upon God as their Father. To enlighten the faith of the elect, the RCIA provides for liturgical presentations of the Creed, during the week following the first scrutiny, and of the Lord's Prayer following the third scrutiny.



Liturgy Notes (Continued)


Holy Week is the most sacred time in the life of a parish community. It is what we have been preparing for all of Lent. It is the highlight of what our faith is all about. As we enter into the holiest of weeks, know that the presence of all the faithful at these liturgies is important. Each service is unique. The solemn liturgies for Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday are among the very best things we do in the church. Yes, these liturgies are known to be longer than usual. Yes, they are different, but isn't that to be expected? Special events always cause us to change our routine way of doing things. The celebrations of Holy Week are a climactic conclusion to our Lenten experience. **As we move from the "Hosannas" of Palm Sunday to the remembrance table of Holy Thursday, may our faith strengthen us to go from the Good Friday Cross of Calvary to the living waters of Holy Saturday and to the joyful resounding of our Easter "ALLELUIAS!"**



"Triduum" comes from two Latin words (*tres* and *dies*) that means "a space of three days." Since we have four days with special names, **Holy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday** and **Easter Sunday**, the "three" may be confusing. (Continued on next page)

Liturgy Notes (Continued)

The confusion is cleared up when we understand how the days are reckoned. On all high festival days the Church counts a day in the same way as Jewish people count days and festivals, that is, from sundown to sundown. Thus, the **Triduum** consists of three twenty-four hour periods that stretch over four calendar days.



The holy season of Lent ends at sundown on **Holy Thursday**; thus the day of **Holy Thursday** itself is the last day of Lent.

The **Paschal Triduum of the Passion, Death, and Resurrection** of the Lord, begins at sundown on **Holy Thursday** with the **Mass of the Lord's Supper**, has its center and high point in the **Easter Vigil**, and closes with **Evening Prayer** at sundown on the **Sunday of the Resurrection**. The celebration of the **Easter Triduum** is the core around which the whole church revolves. The meaning of every feast, every Sunday, is linked and rooted in the **Easter Mystery**. The emphasis is on the unity of these days, not the separating of the Death and Resurrection. From its first years the Church could never speak of nor understand one without the other.

In a very tangible way, the first gathering on **Holy Thursday** evening, is dominated by a feeling for our identity as Church, for how our passing-over from death to life in Jesus is known in our service to each other and to the world.



Good Friday, the **Celebration of the Passion of the Lord**, proclaims the “triumph” of the death of Jesus. The mood of this day is one of simplicity, quiet and reverent prayer. The liturgy of this day ends, as it begins, in silence.

On **Holy Saturday**, the Church waits at the Lord's tomb, meditating on his suffering and death: it is a **Sabbath**, which Jesus made for us. It is God's gift. These last hours of the **Triduum** make us feel like we are “keeping watch”—the conclusion of the **Triduum** pulls us forward. The **Easter Vigil** on **Holy Saturday** is the heart of the liturgy: of our **Lent** and **Eastertide**, of the **Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist)**, **healing (Reconciliation and Anointing of the Sick)**, **Ordaining to Ministry and Marrying**. It is for us the whole mystery of this Passover presence of God filling our souls, our assembly, and even our world.



Prayer for Palm Sunday

Lord God,
I give You thanks, for You are good, and Your mercy is endless.
Here I stand, at the start of this Holy Week,
This week in which Your church remembers Jesus' passion and death,
And I am distracted by many things.
Turn my eyes now to the One who comes in Your name
The One who opens the gates of righteousness
The One who answers when we call.
I bless You, Lord, for shining Your light upon me,
And for sending Your Son to us, in human frailty.
To walk the road we walk.
Open my eyes that I may see Him coming,
And may praise Him with a pure heart.
And may walk in the way of His suffering,
And share also in His resurrection.
Through Jesus Christ our Lord, who
lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God for ever and ever.
