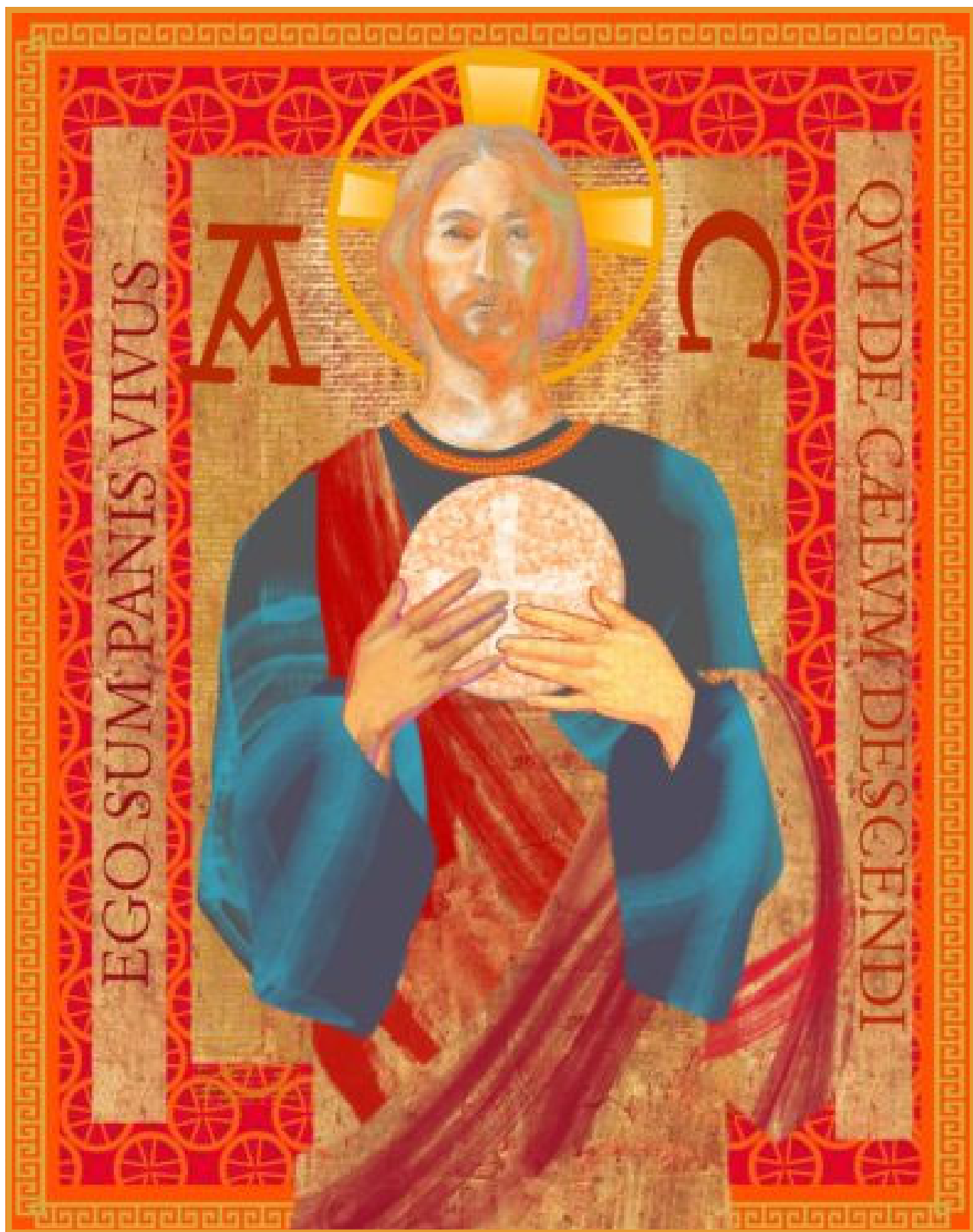

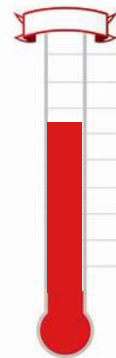

Liturgy Notes

The Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ

The Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ was established in about 1250 and has been given many names over the centuries: Feast of the Eucharist, Feast of the Most Blessed Sacrament, and Feast of God. In fact, in France today it is still known as the "Fete-Dieu." The solemnity developed at about the same time as the elevation of the consecrated bread and wine during the Mass. The liturgy for this solemnity has special elements. The sequence, "Lauda Sion," a medieval poem attributed to Saint Thomas Aquinas, can be recited or sung after the second reading. This year, the Easter Sequence, "*Víctimae Pascháli laudes*" and Pentecost Sequence, "*Veni Sancte Spíritus*" were sung on their respective solemnities. A procession with the Blessed Sacrament can conclude the Mass instead of the usual blessing and dismissal. Regarding Eucharistic processions, Pope Benedict stated, "The procession represents an immense and public blessing for our city: Christ is, in person, the divine Blessing for the world...May our streets be the streets of Jesus!"



Corpus Christi: Ser alimento para los demás

Por eso, esta semana, la “palabra de vida” nos invita a intentar ser nosotros alimento para los demás, fortaleza y consuelo para los demás, lo mismo que el Señor lo ha sido y lo sigue siendo para nosotros. Si Cristo ha sido alimento para nosotros, seámoslo nosotros para todos aquellos que están necesitados de ayuda, de consuelo, de esperanza. Aliméntate de la Eucaristía, si puedes diariamente. Reza ante el Sagrario y busca ayuda y consuelo en él.
