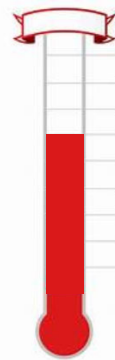

Phase 1 Reopening Plan



In order to have time to disinfect the church between Masses, times have been adjusted:

TEMPORARY MASS SCHEDULE

Monday through Saturday morning Masses remain at 8:00am

The Saturday Vigil Mass has been changed to 4:00pm from 4:30pm

The Saturday Spanish Mass is still to be celebrated at 6:00pm

Sunday Masses are 8:00am and 11:30am

The 9:45am and 6:00pm Masses will be celebrated privately in the rectory chapel

- Please note that we will not “pass the basket” for offertory. There will be offering boxes available at the entrances of the church. Please be as generous as your means allow.
- The staff will disinfect pews and all the obvious "touch" spots between all Masses with safe and EPA-approved products. Please leave the church immediately after Mass so we have the appropriate time to disinfect. We are not able to begin disinfecting until everyone has exited the church.
- Please do not congregate after Masses.
- Because of the disinfecting process, the church doors will not be open until approximately 10 minutes before Mass begins.
- For everyone's safety, we ask that you wear your facemask and socially distance yourself at all times while on church grounds.
- We will be utilizing every other row of pews for seating. Please follow the signs as to which pews are closed. Other than families and couples, please maintain at least six feet between you and the person next to you.
- Please bring and use your personal sanitizer if at all possible. If you cannot, there will be some available at the church entrances.
- One restroom will be open and will be disinfected between Masses.
- Please follow the ushers' direction regarding seating and the Communion line. Each Communion line will be single file. Please be sure to socially distance yourself from the person in front of you.
- Please receive in the hand only and keep your hand as flat as possible to avoid contact.

We will continue to update you as things progress. Please be patient with us as we work to make our return as seamless as possible.

We need to raise \$10,000 - \$15,000!

One thing we've learned during these tough times is how important staying connected with the parish is to our parishioners. We do this through social media, direct mail, email, Flocknote and most importantly, live streaming our Masses and other services. Many people aren't ready to return to Mass yet and many others are homebound and can't come to church. Knowing how important this is to all of us, we need to invest in A/V (audio/video) equipment to keep streaming our Masses and services on a regular basis. We estimate the equipment, furniture, wiring, programming, and installation will cost between \$10,000—\$15,000!

Liturgy Notes

The Solemnity of Pentecost

We call Pentecost the birthday of the Church. On this day the ascended Jesus sent the promised "Advocate" by pouring the Holy Spirit on his disciples (*John 16:7*).

Filling the house with a sound of rushing wind, the Spirit energized the disciples, showing them the meaning of the Old Testament and how Jesus' life and death fulfilled it. Just as important, the Spirit empowered them for the mission, baptizing them with power to bring this truth to all the people of the world.

The Day of Pentecost completes the Easter Season because, through the gift of the Holy Spirit, the disciples were able to understand the meaning of Jesus' suffering, death and resurrection. The end of the Easter Season opens the door to the Liturgical Season of Ordinary Time, the period from Pentecost to the First Sunday of Advent. Historically, Pentecost, meaning the 50th day, is a Christian Festival with Jewish roots. For Jews, Pentecost was also called the Feast of Weeks, celebrating the end of the grain harvest. The Jewish Pentecost also celebrated the giving of the Law and the founding of the Jewish faith community. Early Christians gave thanks in their Pentecost for the fruits of the Spirit, as well as the founding of the Church, the successor to the Old Testament community.

Gifts of the Holy Spirit

The Gifts of the Holy Spirit are of two kinds: communal and personal. The spirit gives gifts to help build up the community of the faithful, gifts that are described in 1 Corinthians, Chapter 12: speaking wisdom, knowledge, faith, gifts of healing, working of miracles, prophecy, the discernment of spirits, various kinds of tongues and the interpretation of tongues. In general, these gifts help strengthen the community in faith, hope and love.

The seven gifts of the Holy Spirit which are based on the books of the Prophet Isaiah 11:1-2, help an individual live the life of a disciple. They are: wisdom, understanding, knowledge, counsel, fortitude, piety, and fear of the Lord.

Pentecost Sequence

The Pentecost Sequence, a poetic text chanted before the Gospel Alleluia, is attributed to the late 12th century Archbishop of Canterbury, Stephen Langton. It beautifully describes a wide range of activities of the Holy Spirit, among them, bringer of light, source of goods for the poor, comforter, sweet refreshment, solace, healer, strength, guide, and source of joy. Because we receive the gift of the Holy Spirit at our Baptism, strengthened in Confirmation, we too are the source of the Holy Spirit's activities to others.

Come, O Holy Spirit, come! And from your celestial home Shed a ray of light divine! Come, O Father of the poor! Come, source of all our store! Come, within our bosoms shine. You, of comforters the best; You, the soul's most welcome guest; Sweet refreshment here below; In our labor, rest most sweet; Grateful coolness in the heat; Solace in the midst of woe. O most blessed Light divine, Shine within these hearts of yours, And our inmost being fill! Where you are not, we have naught, Nothing good in deed or thought, Nothing free from taint of ill. Heal our wounds, our strength renew; On our dryness pour your dew; Wash the stains of guilt away: Bend the stubborn heart and will; Melt the frozen, warm the chill; Guide the steps that go astray. On the faithful, who adore and confess you evermore, In your sevenfold gift descend; Give them virtue's sure reward; Give them your salvation, Lord; Give them joys that never end! Amen. Alleluia!
