Deacon's Corner

Lunatic, Liar, or Lord?

The beginning of today's Gospel reading describes three groups of people holding different states of belief. Mark tells us that Jesus' relatives believed He was **out of His mind**, the scribes believed that He was **possessed by a demon**, and the crowd seemingly didn't know what to believe so they **followed Him** to find out if He truly was the anticipated Messiah. This must have been a very contentious situation for Jesus. His own relatives didn't believe He was the Messiah but believed He was crazy. The scribes also didn't believe He was the Messiah but believed that His teachings and miraculous deeds were deceptions and lies stemming from demonic sources, and the crowds that gathered around Him believed in the coming of the Messiah, but weren't entirely certain that it was Jesus. This situation reminds me of an argument that the apologist C.S. Lewis used to defend the divinity of Jesus. He stated,

"You must make your choice. Either this man was, and is, the Son of God, or else a madman or something worse. You can shut him up for a fool, you can spit at him and kill him as a demon or you can fall at his feet and call him Lord and God, but let us not come with any patronizing nonsense about his being a great human teacher. He has not left that open to us. He did not intend to. ... Now it seems to me obvious that He was neither a lunatic nor a fiend: and consequently, however strange or terrifying or unlikely it may seem, I have to accept the view that He was and is God."

While all true Christians believe in Jesus as the Messiah, at times our faith waivers and drifts and we find ourselves in company with one of these groups. We seldom remain at rest within any one but usually move about these groups as we search for excuses to defend our weakness in faith. When our misguided attachment to things or pride prevents us from accepting an element of our Catholic faith, such as the sacrament of confession, we become like Jesus' relatives. When we refuse to believe in the true teachings of the Catholic Church, we are hiding within the shadows of the scribes. And when our life isn't rooted in prayer and in studying the Word of God, our spirit grows weak and joins the crowds in search for divine nourishment and enlightenment in Jesus Christ.

If we were able to go and visit Jesus in Capernaum, who would we be in company with? Let us all resolve to carefully examine our faith to see if we are listening to the voices of the relatives, scribes or crowds and if so, to leave them behind as we walk towards Christ in perfect faith.

Health and Wellness Ministry presents 'Sun Safety from the CDC'



The sun's ultraviolet (UV) rays can damage your skin in as little as 15 minutes. Be aware of reflective surfaces like concrete, sand and water.

SHADE—You can reduce your risk of skin damage and skin cancer by seeking shade under an umbrella, tree, or other shelter before you need relief from the sun especially between the hours of 10am to

4pm. Your best bet to protect your skin is to use sunscreen or wear protective clothing when you're outside—even when you're in the shade

CLOTHING— Clothes made from tightly woven fabric and long-sleeved shirts and long pants and skirts can provide protection from UV rays. A wet T-shirt offers much less UV protection than a dry one, and darker colors may offer more protection than lighter colors. Clothing certified under international standards comes with information on its ultraviolet protection factor. Keep in mind that a T-shirt has an SPF rating lower than 15, so use other types of protection as well.

HAT—For the most protection, wear a hat with a brim all the way around that shades your face, ears, and the back of your neck. If you wear a baseball cap, you should also protect your ears and the back of your neck by wearing clothing that covers those areas or using a broad spectrum sunscreen with at least SPF 15.

SUNGLASSES— Sunglasses protect your eyes from UV rays and reduce the risk of cataracts. They also protect the tender skin around your eyes from sun exposure. Sunglasses that block both UVA and UVB rays offer the best protection. Wrap-around sunglasses work best because they block UV rays from sneaking in from the side.

SUNSCREEN—Put on broad spectrum sunscreen with at least SPF 15 before you go outside, even on slightly cloudy or cool days. Don't forget to put a thick layer on all parts of exposed skin. And remember, sunscreen works best when combined with other options to prevent UV damage, i.e., clothes, hat, shade, etc.

How sunscreen works. These products work by absorbing, reflecting, or scattering sunlight. They contain chemicals that interact with the skin to protect it from UV rays. All products do not have the same ingredients; if your skin reacts badly to one product, try another one or call a doctor. Shelf life is 3 years, less if exposed to heat.

SPF. Sunscreens are assigned a sun protection factor (SPF) number that rates their effectiveness in blocking UV rays. Higher numbers indicate more protection. You should use a broad spectrum sunscreen with *at least SPF 15*. Re-apply every 2 hours and after swimming, sweating, or toweling off.

Cosmetics. Some makeup and lip balms contain some of the same chemicals used in sunscreens. If they do not have at least SPF 15, don't use them by themselves.
