Deacon's Corner

Humility Triumphs

When a conquering hero of the ancient world rode into town in triumph, it was in a regal chariot or on the back of a stately stallion. Legions of soldiers accompanied him in the victory procession. Triumphal arches, festooned with relief sculptures, were often erected to immortalize his valiant victory.

After driving out demons, healing the sick, and raising the dead, it was time for the King of Kings to enter the Holy City. But to do so, he rode not on the back of a warhorse, but a donkey. His companions accompanied him brandishing not swords, but palm branches. The monument to his victory, erected a week later, was not an arch, but a crucifix.

His earthly beginning was frightfully humble. And his earthly end would be no different. The wood of the manger prefigured the wood of the cross. From beginning to end, the details are humiliating. No room in the inn. Born amidst the stench of a stable. Hunted by Herod's henchmen. Growing up in a far-flung province of the Roman Empire—Galilee, the land where the country accent is so thick, you can cut it with a knife. How was it that the high priest's servant-girl knew that Peter was a disciple of Jesus? His hillbilly accent gave him away (Mat 26:73). Jesus disciples were not cultured, learned men of ability. They were drawn from the low-life of a backwater region.

When one of his closest companions offered to betray him, he did not require millions. Jesus' worth was reckoned to be no more than the Old Testament "book value" for a slave—thirty pieces of silver (Ex 21:32). When he was finally handed over to the Romans, he was not given the punishment meted out to Roman citizens. Beheading was the quick, dignified way to execute someone of any standing. Instead Jesus was given punishments reserved only for slaves and rebellious members of subjugated peoples—flagellation and crucifixion. These two penalties were not just about the pain, but about the humiliation. In first century Palestine, men and women typically covered themselves from head to toe, even in the scorching heat. A crucified man was stripped naked and put on display for all to see.

But this is not primary a story of violence and humiliation. The events of Holy Week are much more about love and humility.

That's why on Passion Sunday we read the powerful words of Paul's letter from the Philippians (2:6-11). Though the Divine Word was God, dwelling in the serene heights of heavenly glory, he freely plunged to the depths of human misery, joining himself to our frail nature, entering into our turbulent world. As if this act of humility were not enough, he further humbled himself, accepting the status of a slave. His act of stooping down to wash the feet of his disciples (Jn 13) was a parable of his whole human existence, for this act was regarded as so undignified that not even Israelite slaves could be compelled to do it.

But that's just it. Jesus was not compelled to do it. He willingly lowered himself in his birth, in his ministry, in his death. No one took his life from him. He freely laid down his own life (Jn 10:18). Others did not have the chance to humble him; he humbled himself.

It had to be so. The Second Adam had to undo the damage caused by the first. What was the sin our first parents? They disobeyed because they wanted to know what God knew, to be like God, to exalt themselves over God (Gen 3). They were bitten by the Serpent, and injected with the deadly venom of Pride. The antidote, the anti-venom could only be humility. The footwashing, donkey-riding New Adam would crush the head of the deadly serpent by means of loving, humble obedience.

The first-born of many brothers lowered himself to the dust from which the First Adam has been made—indeed humility comes from the word "humus." But God responded to his humility by exalting him far above Caesars, kings, and even Hollywood stars. And he invites us to share his glory with him. But first we must walk on his road to glory, the royal road of the cross.







Queremos que sea nuestro amigo en todos los momentos de nuestra vida. **Oración para poner las palmas benditas en el hogar:** Bendice Señor nuestro hogar. Que tu Hijo Jesús y la Virgen María reinen en él. Por tu intercesión danos paz, amor y respeto, para que respetándonos y amándonos los sepamos honrar en nuestra vida familiar, sé tú, el Rey en nuestro hogar. Amén.

Triduo Pascual

Jueves Santo. El jueves Santo se celebra: La Última Cena. El Lavatorio de los pies. La institución de la Eucaristía y del Sacerdocio. La oración de Jesús en el Huerto de Getsemaní. Este es el día en que se instituyó la Eucaristía, el sacramento del Cuerpo y la Sangre de Cristo bajo las especies de pan y vino. Cristo tuvo la Última Cena con sus apóstoles y por el gran amor que nos tiene, se quedó con nosotros en la Eucaristía, para guiarnos en el camino de la salvación. Todos estamos invitados a celebrar la cena instituida por Jesús. Cristo nos deja su Cuerpo y su Sangre. Revivamos este gran don y comprométámonos a servir a nuestros hermanos. Jesús en este pasaje del Evangelio nos enseña a servir con humildad y de corazón a los demás. Este es el mejor camino para seguir a Jesús y para demostrarle nuestra fe en Él. Vivir como servidores unos de otros.

Viernes Santo En esta conmemoración nos encontramos con el acto de la "adoración" de la Cruz. Esto es algo que podría sonar extraño y hasta dar la sensación que estamos adorando algo que no es Dios. Pero lo cierto es que la fe católica distingue la adoración absoluta a Dios en cuanto lo que es, y la adoración de latría relativa en cuanto a lo que es representado. La Cruz por tanto representa a Cristo crucificado, y la Cruz también rememora la Cruz real sobre la que estuvo colgado Cristo, en contacto con su cuerpo y bañada con su sangre. De ahí, que la adoración de la Cruz no se hace por ella en sí, sino por el Hijo de Dios en ella.

Las Siete Palabras: Palabra de Misericordia: **Padre, perdónalos, porque no saben lo que hacen (Lucas 23:34.)**. Palabra Alentadora: **De cierto te digo: hoy estarás conmigo en el paraíso (Lucas 23:43)**. Palabra de Responsabilidad: **Mujer he aquí a tu hijo, Juan he aquí a tu madre (Juan 19:26-27)**. Palabra Conmovedora: **¡Dios mío, Dios mío! ¿Por qué me has abandonado? (Mateo 27:47)**. Palabra Expresiva: **Tengo sed (Juan 19: 28)**. Palabra Garantizadora: **Todo se ha consumado (Juan 19:30)**. Palabra Reveladora: **Padre en tus manos encomiendo mi Espíritu (Lucas 23:45)**.

Vigilia Pascual "Sábado Santo:" La Vigilia Pascual es la celebración más importante del año, la culminación de la Semana Santa y el eje de toda la vida cristiana. Es el momento de reconocer nuestra pertenencia a la Iglesia, el marco adecuado para la liturgia bautismal; de la luz pasamos a la Palabra y ahora al agua de vida. La iniciación cristiana tiene aquí su encuadre perfecto; los sacramentos de iniciación: Bautismo, Confirmación y Eucaristía celebrados encadenadamente reflejan la antiquísima experiencia original de la Iglesia. La Vigilia Pascual, desde su centro celebrativo, abre sus brazos y los extiende por un lado hacia la Cuaresma, reconociendo el mundo del pecado del que nos arranca, y nos proyecta con su otro brazo hacia el Tiempo Pascual, ejercicio de la vida cristiana que es una invitación a vivir la fiesta y el gozo que se realizará plenamente al final de los tiempos.
